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Superintendent's Estimate of Needs 2018-2019

Last night, in a special meeting, Virginia Beach City Public School Superintendent Dr. Aaron Spence announced the school division's Estimate of Needs. The superintendent provided important information on how the division will spend \$770 million.



School Board members listened as Dr. Spence outlined budget priorities: Reducing class size, replacing aging buses and technology, equitable compensation, phase in of full day kindergarten, supporting 1:1, reduce reliance on reversion funds, and contributing PAYGO to the CIP.


What does this mean? The additions of 28 full time positions: 8.6 for elementary,

Hold the Date----May 14, 2018 5:00 pm Kellam High School See a School Representative for information 4.4 for middle and 15 for high. Furthermore, 25 additional staff (12 high school counselors, 10 tech support, and 3 Tech Specialists) will be added. This is a positive step in reducing workload.

Not so positive~ All employees will receive a 2% increase in pay. For teachers, this will be seen in a new, paystep instructional scale. The scale will be limited to 30 steps and a .5 pay increase will be added for each year of service. A 1.5 COLA will be added to each step for the 2018-19 school year. VBEA members recommended that VBCPS return to an instructional paystep scale that incentivizes teachers and allows employees to make more money earlier in their career. This is a positive improvement, however, a 2% raise does not cover the 2.1% COLA. Also, a 1% increase in employee healthcare premiums erodes the 2% raise. Stav tuned for more budget updates.
