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VBEA To End the 22 PD Mandate

In a speech to the School Board and Administration, VBEA President Kelly Walker questioned the reasoning for the 22 hours of mandated professional development for teachers. "The VBEA would like Administration and the School Board to consider decreasing the current 22 hours of professional development for teachers. Understanding that the school calendar embeds professional development, it is appropriate that the number of mandated professional development hours be reduced for teachers.

Also, since the great recession, staff have had a lack of sufficient pay raises, an increase in class size and workload, a 5% pay deduction due to VRS contributions, and an increase in out-ofpocket health care expenses. It is time to alleviate the workload for those who
